CATHEDRAL NEWS

Bereavement Support is available in the parish room of the Cathedral on the last Thursday of the month, between 7:00pm and 8:00pm.

First Friday & Saturday — Next Friday and Saturday are the first of the month; Communion will be brought to the sick and housebound on Friday, and on Saturday there is Mass and office of Our Lady at 11:00am.

Celebrations This Week — Feast of All the Saints of Ireland (6 November); memorials of St Malachy, bishop (3 November; a feast in the Archdiocese of Armagh and the Diocese of Down & Connor), and St Charles Borromeo, bishop (4 November); optional memorials of St Martin de Porres, religious (5 November), and St Willibrord, bishop & missionary (7 November).

COMMEMORATION OF THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

All Souls' Day falls on Sunday 2 November; mass is at 9:00am, 10:30am, 12:30pm and 6:00pm.

Plenary Indulgences for the souls of the departed in Purgatory

- From 12.00 noon on 1 November until 12.00 midnight on 2 November, all who have confessed within the week preceding or following 1 November, received Holy Communion on any day between 1 and 8 November and prayed for the Pope's intentions may gain **one plenary indulgence** by visiting a church or oratory and there reciting one Our Father and the Apostle's Creed.
- Those who visit a cemetery and pray for the dead may gain a plenary indulgence **once per day** between 1 and 8 November. The same conditions apply.

November Novena of Remembrance

at Galway Cathedral

2 November — 10 November

During each day of the novena our liturgy will have a specific focus as follows:



Sunday 2 November For deceased parents, grandparents and family members,

whose love and caring shaped our lives.

Monday 3 November For refugees, migrants, and those displaced by conflict or

disaster, who died seeking safety and hope.

Tuesday 4 November For emigrants and those who died far from home,

separated from loved ones but not from our prayers.

Wednesday 5 November For deceased clergy and religious, who dedicated their lives

to serving God and others.

Thursday 6 November For babies, children and young people who died too soon,

leaving us with unfilled dreams and deep sorrow.

Friday 7 November For those who died by suicide, and for the healing of

families and communities affected by this loss.

Saturday 8 November For victims of tragic accidents, unexpected deaths, and

those lost in sudden circumstances.

Sunday 9 November For all who died in the last year, and for those who

continue to grieve their absence.

Monday 10 November For those killed in war, violence, and natural disasters, and

for innocent lives lost in global turmoil.

Why Sunday Matters: Sunday Mass Creates and Celebrates Communion

Sunday Mass is a vital encounter with the risen Lord, the One who gives our lives ultimate meaning and purpose. Through our baptism we bear the name 'Christian'. This identity shapes who we are and calls us to follow Jesus, who is '...the way, the truth and the life' (John 14:6). Through the celebration of Sunday Mass, we experience a life-giving encounter and communion with Christ. Just as the two disciples encountered Jesus on the road to Emmaus and recognised him in the breaking of bread (Luke 24:35), so too we meet him in the Eucharist.

Our identity as Christians is not solitary but shared. On Sundays, we gather not only as individuals but as the Church: the Body of Christ. In the celebration of the Eucharist, we affirm our communion with one another and with Christ. Pope St John Paul II emphasised that '...none is as vital or as community-forming as the Sunday celebration of the Lord's day and his Eucharist.' This gathering creates a bond of unity, solidarity and love, as we come together to worship as one body, with one voice, in praise of God.
